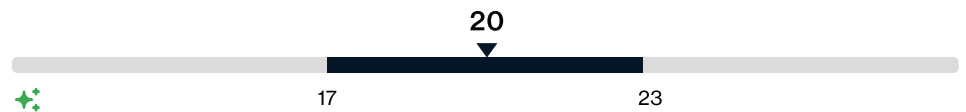

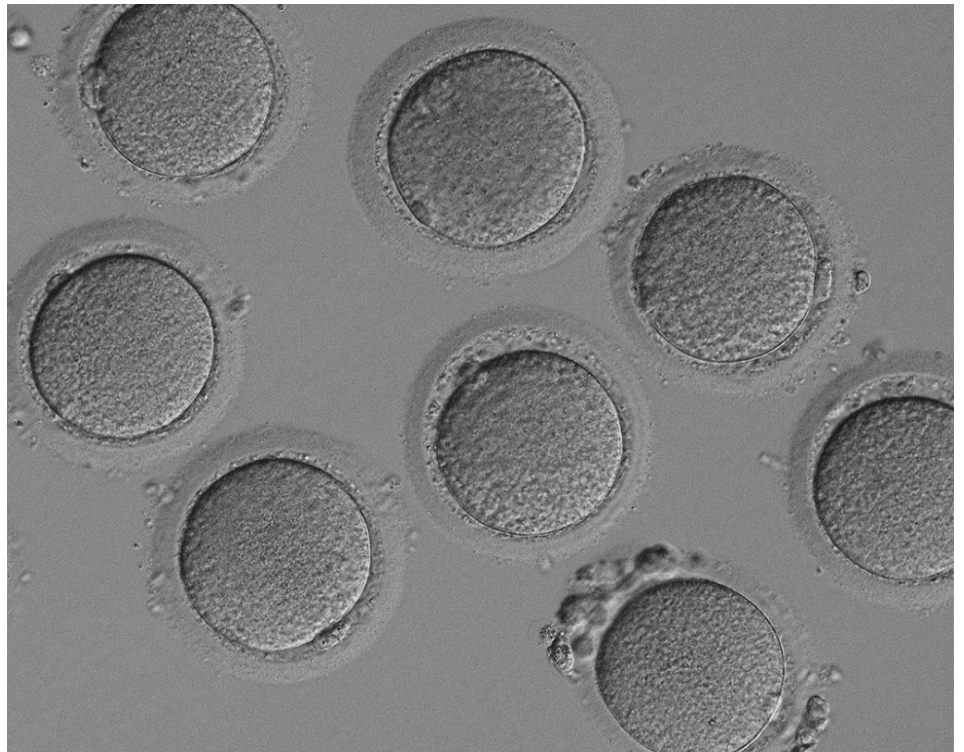
WHAT DOES IT MEAN

Not all follicles in IVF contain eggs, and even when an egg is present, it may not be mature or of good quality. Mature eggs have reached the stage where they have the potential to be fertilized by sperm. We expect 70-80% of retrieved eggs to be mature, but this is an average and more or less may be normal for you.

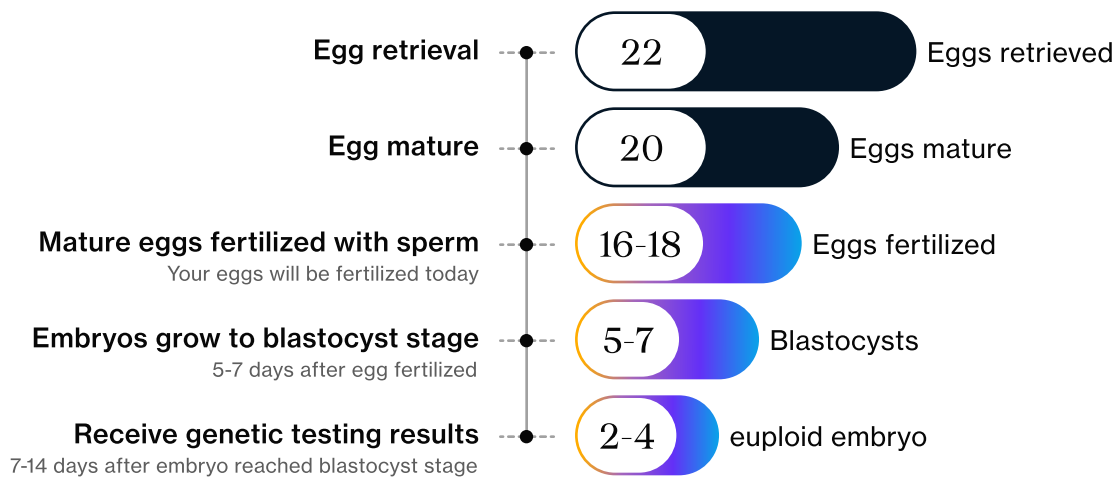

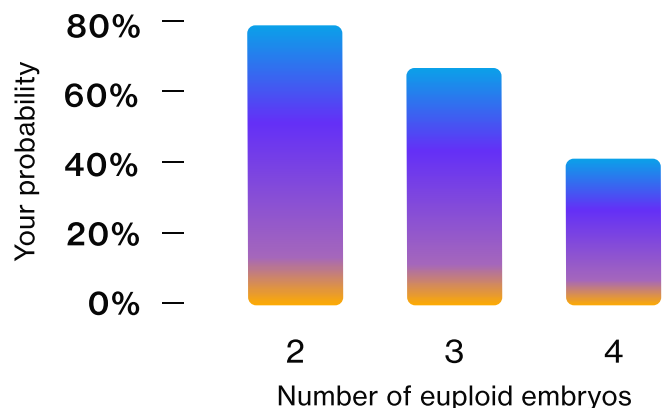

Predicted number of euploid embryos

The graph on the right shows you the probability of having 2, 3 or 4 euploid embryos. As a reminder, a euploid embryo has the correct number of chromosomes (46 total). This makes it more likely to implant, lead to a healthy pregnancy, and result in a healthy baby.



Frequently asked questions

What is a mature oocyte?

A mature oocyte is an egg that has developed to the point where it is ready to be fertilized by sperm. Not all eggs retrieved are mature – some may be too young or not fully developed. Only mature oocytes are capable of being fertilized and potentially becoming embryos.

Why don't all the eggs retrieved become embryos?

It's normal for not every egg to result in an embryo. First, only mature eggs can fertilize. Even among those, not every egg will successfully fertilize with sperm. After fertilization, some embryos may stop growing and not reach the blastocyst stage, this is part of a natural process. Only the healthiest eggs and embryos will continue developing.

What happens next, and when will I get more updates?

After your egg retrieval, we'll monitor how many eggs fertilize and how many embryos continue growing. You'll receive updates at key points, such as fertilization results and blastocyst development. If you are doing genetic testing (PGT), results will take additional time. We'll keep you informed every step of the way and let you know when decisions about embryo freezing, transfer, or next steps can be made.
